On this occasion, the nation recalls with profound esteem the lifelong sacrifice and contribution of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in achieving the nation's long-cherished dream of independence. We also remember with reverence the great contributions of the leading lights of our struggle for independence. We owe too, our deepest tribute to the 3 million martyrs of the War of Liberation who sacrificed their precious lives to secure a future of dignity and prosperity for posterity.

This year's National and Independence Day is specially significant in that it comes in the wake of a general election held in the country in December 2008, in which the people gave an unprecedented massive mandate to the Awami League led by H.E. Sheikh Ha-

sina, the daughter of Bangabandhu, electing her prime minister for a second term. The people's overwhelming verdict was also an expression of their support to her manifesto of change and "Vision 2021" for building an ICT-driven, information-based, happy and prosperous Bangladesh by 2021, the 50th anniversary of its independence. The nation is clearly set on a course to achieving the MDG targets by 2015 while the commencement of democracy will accelerate the country's development.

Internationally, the successful general election has enhanced Bangladesh's liberal democratic credentials, including in Japan. Prime Minister Aso's telephone conversation with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina on her inauguration manifested mutual good will and deep relations. We continue to pursue proactive roles for global peace and development, and are the largest troop contributors to U.N. peacekeeping operations. We also remain unequivocally against international terrorism and human rights violations as party to related U.N. conventions and the UNHRC.

The Bangladesh-Japan friendship has historic connections. It was initiated by Bangabandhu's official visit to Japan in 1973, as the prime minister of a free and independent Bangladesh. Since then the relations have developed steadily and satisfactorily. A Shahid Minar (Language Martyrs Memorial) at Ikebukuro Park in Tokyo embodies the good will between the two peoples. Bangladesh

works closely with Japan to promote global peace and supports Japan's permanent membership on the U.N. Security Council. They also exchange regular visits, including at the highest level. Prime Minister Aso visited Bangladesh in 2006 when he was foreign minister. As the most important development partner Japan's assistance has had a visible socio-economic impact in Bangladesh.

The volume of bilateral trade and investment is yet to reach its full potential. However, joint and new efforts may substantially raise the level for mutual gains. Bangladesh offers enhanced investment support services, incentives, a large market, inexpensive workforce and quality export products as evidenced in JETRO studies recognizing the country as having the lowest cost of doing business and capable of supplying IT products for Japan. Big businesses like NTT DoCoMo, UNIQLO, SEIYU, Ito Yokado, NITORI and Mitsubishi have started or are negotiating to do business in Bangladesh.

Over 10,000 Bangladeshis are engaged in various occupations in Japan, contributing to the economies and promoting friendship between the two countries. The Bangladesh Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Japan, recently celebrated its second anniversary, marking steady progress. Admirably, community members always express solidarity at moments of national crisis, including the recent tragic incidents at the Bangladesh Rifles headquarters at Palkhana, Dhaka. They are recognized as an indispensable asset in constructing a bridge of friendship and good will between our two

countries.

Since the last National and Independence Day, Parliamentary Vice Foreign Minister Yasutoshi Nishimura, State Foreign Affairs Secretary Seiko Hashimoto and a delegation of distinguished ladies led by the wife of former Foreign Minister Masahiko Komura visited Bangladesh. Besides, Bangladesh received prestigious cultural and press awards, and good Japanese media coverage, including Independence and National Day supplements. A \$440 million ODA package and cool earth partnership with Bangladesh were signed, and Japan indicated its willingness to assist in the Padma Bridge project. Happily, we have procured a piece of land in Tokyo for building embassy premises.

The Japan-Bangladesh Parliamentarians' League actively promotes mutual friendship, including the regular dispatch of observer teams to our general elections. Prime Minister Aso assumed the office of president of the Japan-Bangladesh Parliamentarians' League last year, expressing the confidence of Japan in Bangladesh's potential.

I am personally grateful to Prime Minister Aso for receiving me in his office March 24 to convey his felicitations on the eve of our Independence and National Day.

Finally, I extend the warm greetings of the government and people of Bangladesh to the government and people of Japan. I also express my sincere gratitude to the government of Japan for all the support offered to me and the Embassy of Bangladesh in discharging our responsibilities.

May the Bangladesh-Japan friendship live long.

To write about one's country is an extremely demanding task. To write about a people stretches the mind's reach. To write a message about Bangladesh on the day of its birth overwhelms the mind and soul. Its people, past, present and future invoke the finest, the best and the forever.

When Bangladesh entered the international comity of states on March 26, 1971, it proclaimed itself as a rightful member of that comity. It announced that it was born of pain and suffering, and a human struggle for liberation; that such liberation had come after its existence for thousands of years as a nation, now as an independent sovereign republic. It poured forth its identity, from its people, of a language and literature, of its music, culture and values, and gave to the world a distinct statehood hitherto unrecorded in the streams of history.

The Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had declared the country to be "Shonar Bangla (Golden Bengal)." Its people claimed their rightful place among independent and sovereign states. The country spelled forth that it would be national, socialistic, democratic and secular, and would create a society free from exploitation, in which the rule of law, rule by and under the constitution, fundamental human rights and freedoms, equality and justice would prevail, and be secured for all of its citizens. It declared the supremacy of the will of its people so that it may prosper and make a full contribution to international peace and cooperation in keeping with the progressive aspirations of mankind.

In the 38 years since that date when it so proclaimed itself, the country has grown and evolved, stood the test of times, of encroachments and aberrations, of the forces that challenged it, its people's identity, its future

and its leaders. The country has demonstrated repeatedly that its sovereign will and republican character may not be stayed, suspended or abrogated by any whim or extra-constitutional "doctrine of necessity." It has demonstrated its innermost and innate characteristics, of a state to be served by its people and in service of its people.

Bangabandhu's Shonar Bangla has restated its fundamental principles, that of a tolerant and peaceful society within and among a human fortress against detractors and bigots. The country spoke in elections Dec. 29, 2008, that it is the mistress of its destiny and of the kind of life it wishes to have, namely, a democratic and secular society, however harsh this path and process might be.

On this auspicious day, as minister of foreign affairs, it is my privilege and opportunity to call upon the Foreign Ministry in Dhaka and our missions abroad to dedicate themselves to nation building, consolidating statehood and projecting the real Bangladesh to the world. I recall with pride the role of our expatriates for their immense contribution in different spheres of our national life.

I particularly recognize and salute Bangladeshis living abroad, who, through their sweat and toil, have generated earnings and remitted their incomes, which in turn have met our valuable foreign exchange requirements. Our expatriate brothers and sisters are our real goodwill ambassadors who will speak and deliver our nation's pride and achievements.

I take the liberty and opportunity to reaffirm our purpose and will to achieve victory against hunger and poverty, and usher in a quality of life consistent with human dignity. The dream of Bangabandhu to achieve a Shonar Bangla is the task of every citizen. Under the leadership of our prime minister, Jono Netri Sheikh Hasina, the nation has resurrected itself to statehood, embodying and exercising a sovereign will toward the achievement of that dream. I congratulate and felicitate Bangladesh, and all of its people living at home and abroad.
