Vietnam, Japan begin to put pieces in place to become strategic partners

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AMBASSADOR EXTRAORDINARY AND
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REPUBLIC OF VIETNAM TO JAPAN

On Sept. 2, 1945, in Ba Dinh Square, Hanoi, in a grand meeting with scores of thousands of participants, President Ho Chi Minh read the Declaration of Independence, proclaiming to the Vietnamese people and to the world that Vietnam had become a free, independent and sovereign country.

It is meaningful that Vietnam has escaped from the list of poor countries through its tireless endeavors and is determined to become an industrial country by 2020.

Regarding external relations, adopting the motto of diversification, multilateralism and international integration, Vietnam has participated in almost all regional and international organizations and cooperation institutions, most recently becoming a member of the World Trade Organization in 2006 and a nonpermanent member of the U.N. Security Council for the 2008-2009 term.

History proves that Vietnam-Japan relations date back as far as the 15th to 16th centuries, when Japanese commercial ships frequented Vietnam's harbors. Relics of the good friendship and bilateral commercial relations remain, and from time to time they are discovered and have been dearly preserved in the ancient city of Hoi An (Quang Nam province), a Cultural Heritage site recognized by UNESCO.

Over the years, Vietnam-Japan relations have grown steadily. This spring the Vietnamese people had the honor to welcome Crown Prince Naruhito's official visit to Vietnam. In April, General Secretary of the Communist Party of Vietnam Nong Duc Manh paid an official visit to Japan and with Prime Minister Taro Aso unanimously made the "Joint Proclamation on Vietnam-Japan Strategic Partnerships" with the view to enhancing relations between the two nations. Premier Nguyen Tan Dung came to Japan in May on a working visit and attended the "Future of Asia" Conference.

The two nations signed the Vietnam-Japan Economic Partnership Agreement in December 2008 and it will come into force Oct. 1 this year. The "Vietnam-Japan Joint Initiative" aimed at improving the business environment and competitive capacity of Vietnam, which started in 2003, has entered its third stage with encouraging results.

Japan has become one of the top economic partners of Vietnam. Bilateral trade is increasing rapidly and reached \$17 billion in 2008, surpassing the 2010 goal of \$15 billion set by the two countries.

Japan possesses more than 1,000 direct investment projects in Vietnam, with registered capital of more than \$17 billion, and ranks third among more than 80 investing countries and territories. Vietnam welcomes Japanese investors participating in key domains, large-scale projects and in major economic areas, simultaneously providing favorable conditions for small and medium high-technology and subsidiary technology enterprises from various localities of Japan to invest in Vietnam.

Japan is the biggest ODA provider to Vietnam. A series of infrastructure projects, particularly in the transportation and energy domains, plays a very important role in the economic development and improvement of living standards of the population. The projects, which are being implemented in various areas, demonstrate vividly the intimate relations of cooperation and friendship that exist between the two countries.

There are now more than 3,000 Vietnamese students and 17,000 trainees in Japan. Vietnam highly appreciates Japanese cooperation in building excellent human resources for our national development.

Direct flights connecting Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City, and probably Da Nang in the near future, with Japanese destinations such as Narita, Osaka, Fukuoka and Nagoya every year transport over 400,000 Japanese tourists to Vietnam and scores of thousands of Vietnamese to Japan, thus making the two nations closer and closer.

On this occasion, I would like to extend my hearty congratulations over the eminent successes of this year's Japan Sakura Festival in Hanoi (April) and the Japanese Festival in Hoi An (August), and in return, I hope that Japanese people will have the chance to enjoy Vietnamese culture at the Vietnamese Festival in Yoyogi Park, Tokyo (Sept. 19-20), Vietnamese Foods Week at the Okura Hotel, Tokyo (Sept. 14-21), as well as Vietnam's Roadshows and Tourism Fairs in Sakai (Sept. 12), Osaka (Sept. 13-14), Nagoya (Sept. 15-16) and at the Tokyo Big Sight (Sept. 18-20).

On behalf of the Vietnamese government and people I would like to express my most sincere gratitude to Their Imperial Majesties Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko, Their Imperial Highnesses Crown Prince Naruhito and Crown Princess Masako, and the entire Imperial family, as well as to the government, Diet members, business circles, scholars of Japan and the Japa-
