A requiem mass, attended by members of government, the diplomatic corps and the general public was organized at the Yaoundé Notre Dame Cathedral in honor of the victims of the earthquake and tsunami.

It is for this reason that the Embassy of Cameroon has decided not to hold its traditional National Day celebrations this year.
