The DRC has many opportunities in this field (copper, cobalt, diamonds, gold, uranium, cassiterite, niobium, manganese, tin, oil, etc.).

A long time ago, the government initiated economic reforms aimed at stabilizing the macroeconomic situation and promoting economic growth to attract investments. The country also has a code of investments and a mining code interesting for those who wish to invest in the DRC.

In the energy field, the government is finalizing the large hydroelectric dam of Inga on the Congo River. This project is to become a regional project (NE-PAD) that can supply electricity to many African countries. The Japanese private sector can also join other African partners in this big project such as South Africa, the U.S., European Union, etc. It is known that sustainable development cannot occur in the ab-

sence of electric power.

Others fields that may interest the Japanese private sectors are: tourism, agriculture, textile, transports (airways, railways, ports) and forests/timber. For this last point the DRC has about 46 percent of equatorial forests with many available species of timber. This rich environment is the reason the DRC plays an important role against the effects of global warming.

In conclusion, the Democratic Republic of the Congo congratulates very much H.E. Prime Minister Abe for his decision to continue to sustain the TICAD process for African development.

As I said last year, the relations between Japan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo are excellent. The cooperation is heading up more and more. The recent inauguration

of the new JICA Center in Kinshasa is one of example of excellent relations between Japan and the Democratic Republic of Congo.

So, I encourage the group of Japanese companies that visited our country last October to continue to go to invest in our country. This will show a good and real example that you are following the prime minister's steps, as he said during TICAD V.
