On this momentous day, we pay deep reverence to the many valiant Angolans who have paid the ultimate sacrifice during the long and arduous struggle for independence that culminated in the birth of Angola as a sovereign state on Nov. 11, 1975.

Angola at 43 has made great strides, particularly after rising from the rubble of a devastating and violent 27-year-long civil war that ended in 2002. Elections were held in August 2017, resulting in a peaceful transition of power in Angola

with the election of H.E. Joao Manuel Goncalves Lourenco as the new president. Based on its own experience with conflict resolution and national reconciliation, Angola has been playing a key role in the preservation of peace and security in the South African Development Community and the Great Lakes Region. According to the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund, Angola's gross domestic product grew from \$12.49 billion in 2002 to \$197.89 billion in 2018. Likewise, life expectancy in Angola went from 49 years in 2002 to 60 years in 2018. The Angolan government will not rest on its laurels; it

The recent visit to Japan by Minister of External Affairs H.E.

Manuel Domingos Augusto is a testament to the existing friendly relations between our two countries.

We value Japan's efforts and contributions to the development of Africa, particularly through the Tokyo International Conference on African Development process, as well as the Japanese government's push for the private sector to invest in Africa. Angola has abundant natural resources, including petroleum, natural gas, phosphates, iron ore, copper, zinc, lead, manganese, gold, bauxite, gemstones and more. These resources, coupled with its economic diversification strategy, improving business environment and a growing young population, offers a promising outlook for Japanese companies.
