# Aspiring to bolster friendly partnership

After many decades of fighting for independence against foreign aggression and colonization, the Lao People's Democratic Republic was proclaimed on Dec. 2, 1975. This is a meaningful day

for all multiethnic Lao people as it brought a sense of real freedom, ownership and self-determination. Every year, the party, government and corporate entities, as well as Lao people within and outside the country, jointly celebrate this important day to review our previous accomplishments and pay respect to our ancestors who dedicated, sacrificed and tirelessly struggled for the liberation and development of the country.

I am proud to witness the progress and development of the Lao PDR throughout the last 48 years. Under the leadership of the Lao People's Revolutionary Party, our country has enjoyed political stability, economic growth and social order. The party and government have created policies and strategies in each period, based on national and regional circumstances, aimed at protecting our sovereignty and territorial integrity and building peace, independence, democracy, unity and prosperity.

2023 marks the onset of recovery after the four-year outbreak of COVID-19. Before the pandemic, the Lao PDR witnessed consistent economic growth, averaging 7% annually. This year, growth is expected to reach only 4.2%, which is lower than expected. While the country still faces many challenges, such as financial and economic difficulties, including inflation and climbing

global food and energy prices, the government is actively engaged in implementing comprehensive measures and has made addressing economic and financial hardship a key priority in the national agenda.

The Lao economic structure is gradually shifting toward industrialization and modernization. Many sectors have been expanded, resulting in a reduction in the poverty rate and enhancing people's living standards. Additionally, there has been an increase in the birth rate, a decrease in child mortality and a rise in the number of young citizens, with individuals aged 15 to 64 constituting 64.9% of the population. Based on a 2021 assessment by the U.N. Committee for Development Policy, the Lao PDR is expected to be able to escape from least-developed country status in 2026. I am optimistic the Lao PDR will accomplish this as expected.

The Lao PDR and Japan have enjoyed long-standing, friendly relations and good cooperation for almost seven decades since the establishment of diplomatic relations in 1955. I am pleased to recognize that the existing strategic partnership, established in 2015, has been deepened and broadened in many areas. 2023 is another remarkable vear for bilateral relations as the leaders of our countries have returned to face-to-face visits following the pandemic. Outstandingly, the president of the Lao PDR paid a visit to Japan in May. Beyond that, there have been many alternating visits between high-ranking officials of our two parties, parliaments and governments this year. Recently, our foreign ministers had reciprocal visits within a single month. Both sides held candid discussions and agreed to work together to further upgrade the bilateral strategic partnership to greater heights.

Japan has been the top donor of official development assistance to the Lao PDR



since 1991. Especially noteworthy this year was the signing of four exchanges of notes concerning grant assistance projects to our country, including the significant Chao Anouvong Stadium reconstruction project at a cost of ¥4.17 billion. This will become an important sports facility for the people in Vientiane and the Lao people as a whole. Furthermore, there are many technical assistance projects being provided, as well as assistance in preparing for the chairmanship of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations next year. All assistance has significantly contributed to our national socioeconomic development. I would like to express my heartfelt appreciation to the government and the people of Japan for assisting my country over the past decades.

Regarding economic cooperation, bilateral trade volume has increased by 72%

compared with 2017. I note that our countries still have much potential for further cooperation, particularly in the areas of agriculture, food processing, manufacturing, green energy and tourism. The Lao PDR has an abundance of natural resources, forests, rivers and fertile soil, while Japan has capital, knowledge and advanced technology. Further expansion of our cooperation in the agriculture sector should be an issue of interest to both sides.


