Recent years have indeed been years of great struggles to revive the economic growth and allow stability through many reforms, which have facilitated dialogue among the political circle and even among the Togolese citizens.

These positive results have

enabled Togo to be more present in international relations. Indeed, in its capacity as a non-permanent member of the U.N.
