I feel extremely honored to convey, on behalf of the Japan-Argentina Association, my sincere congratulations to the people and government of the Republic of Argentina on the auspicious occasion of their National Day.

Having rolled back the afflictions of the economic and financial debacle at the beginning of this century, Argentina has been enjoying a high rate of economic growth, in the range of 6 to 9 percent per year since 2003. It is indeed with great admiration and respect to note that Argentina successfully manages to maintain itself on the expansion track despite the general weakening of the global economy, under the leadership of President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner, who is serving her second term after winning an overwhelming majority of votes in the election held in 2011.

Ever since the Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation was concluded in 1898 between Japan and Argentina, both countries have been closely tied for the past 110 years by strong bonds of friendship. All the good will expressed by the Argentine

gentina with pride.

Bilateral relations are remarkable, but certainly there is a huge potential for future development. Argentina and Japan have a system of regular political consultations — the last meeting was held last year and the next is planned for the second half of 2012. There are other institutional frameworks to address specific issues, such as cultural, scientific and technical cooperation, and other areas of mutual interest that seek the possibility of opportunities for concrete cooperation projects and specific businesses.

Top-level visits such as that of Foreign Minister Hector Timerman to Japan last year or that of former Prime Minister Naoto Kan, who attended the inauguration of the new presidential term of President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner in Buenos Aires, express the importance assigned by both Argentina and Japan to their bilateral political ties.

Japan has an assured place and is held in very high consideration in the contemporary cultural presence in Buenos Aires. Among others, Ryuichi Sakamoto in music and Haruki Murakami in literature are

greatly demanded presences. Sakamoto honored Buenos Aires with concerts a week ago, and Murakami made an unprecedented editorial success for a translated Japanese author with the presentation this May of his novel "1Q84" at the recently held 38th Buenos Aires International Book Fair. The tuning through and between the standards and the evolution from our countries' cultural vibrations happens with always renewed intensity on the wings of tango music's popularity, which in Japan has brought waves of Argentinean and Japanese musicians, dance performers and dance events that spread all over the territory of these islands with touching and rewarding allure.

As for the bilateral economic and trade relationship, Japan is a major and successful foreign investor in Argentina, with com-

in the planning and execution of various events such as the Argentine Fair, soccer games, etc., to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the foundation of Argentina. The tango, a cultural heritage of Argentina, is also an area of significant importance in the bilateral cultural exchanges, and therefore features the work program of our association. We are determined to continue to do our utmost to further strengthen

panies and industrial plants, especially in the automotive and auto parts industry, as well as in food production.

The interest of Japanese firms to expand their financial involvement abroad in strategic markets and high-growth economies is increasing. Argentina, which in 2011 reached 9.2 percent gross domestic product (GDP) growth, is no stranger to this interest, being attractive to foreign investors because of its great diversity of climate and soils, significant mineral and forest resources, its nearly 5,000 km of Atlantic coastline and enviable energy resources. Our country also has Latin America's highest percentage of scientific researchers in relation to its population. Its skilled workforce and innovative capacity enable competitiveness in areas where the country has a long history,

such as aerospace, nuclear, biotechnology, software and information technology.

In 2011 bilateral trade between Argentina and Japan rose 10.83 percent, reaching a total of \$2.06 billion. Imports and sales of Argentinean products — mainly food and commodities — increased in the past year, as well as exports of industrial products from Japan to Argentina.

This robust growth highlights the vast field of opportunity and potential for expansion of bilateral trade beyond the current level.

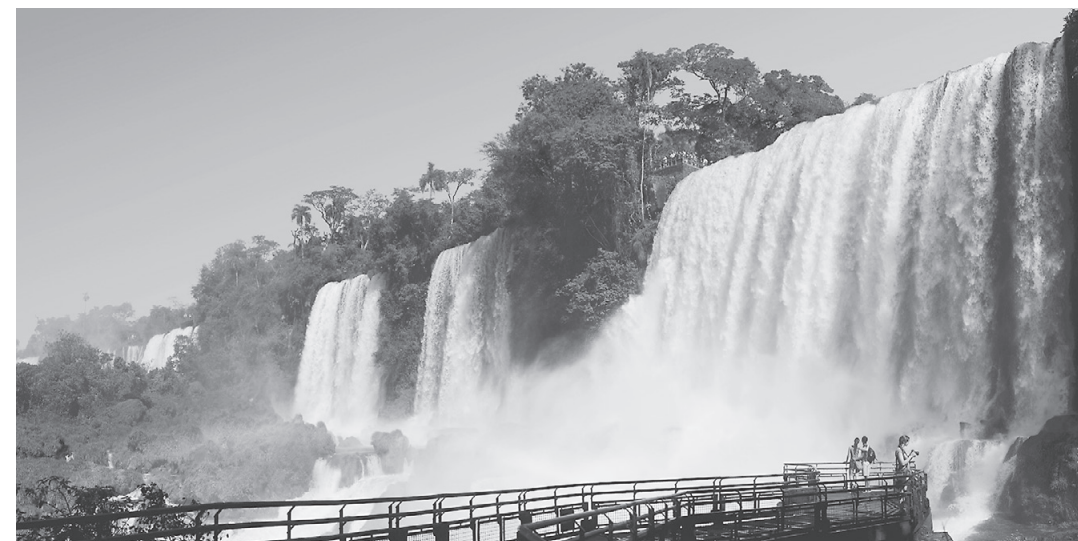

There is no doubt whatsoever that Argentina, endowed with very fertile land and abundant natural resources in its vast territory, is a country of incredible potential and will emerge as a very prosperous nation that will be entrusted with a leading role in the world.

Historical closeness may spur more diversified bilateral relations

A noteworthy development in business conducted between Japan and Argentina took place in 2009, when Argentina decided to adopt the Integrated Services Digital Broadcasting (ISDB), a Japanese standard for digital television. Although the bilateral trade and direct investment have been stable for years, there should be room for further growth if the two countries could optimize vast potentials available with each other.

In this regard, I would like to

note that the Japan-Argentina Business Cooperation Committee plans to hold its 23rd joint meeting in Buenos Aires on Nov. 15-16. It is our sincere hope that the meeting will provide the two countries with opportunities for productive exchanges on bilateral trade and investment.

In closing, please allow us to again offer our heartiest congratulations to the government and people of the Republic of Argentina on this important day.
