The visit to Japan by H.E Dr. Tewodros Adhanom, minister for health, by kind invitation from the Tokushukai Group, was aimed in understanding the philosophy of group Chairman Torao Tokuda and getting more experience from the success of Tokushukai in building high-tech health facilities and management all over Japan and abroad, as well as to negotiate for possible expansion of such a philosophy and projects to Ethiopia. All visits were fruitful and successful in strengthening the cordial relation between our

people relations between the two countries and building Ethiopia's image in Japan. The Ethiopian Night, which has become an annual event in which cultural exchanges between the two countries take center stage, was held at the beginning of November last year. The celebration marked the 40th anniversary of the Ethiopian Association of Japan, which signifies the long-standing friendship between Ethiopia and Japan. The Nilo-Ethiopian Association's annual event was also successfully held earlier this year at Kyoto University, on April 20 and 21, in which an Ethiopian coffee exhibition and seminar on Nilo-Ethiopian area studies were the core components. This is due to its political and social stability, macroeconomic stability and rapidly growing economy; excellent climate and fertile soils; pro-investment government; abundant and trainable labor force; strategic location at the crossroads between Africa, the Middle East and Asia; the lowest crime rates in Africa; simple and transparent investment approval procedures; competitive incentive packages; access to a wide market; its richest histories and traditions on the African continent; and UNESCO World Heritage sites. Ethiopia is now becoming an ideal place for trade, investment and tourism. Today, Ethiopia is open for business and opportunities. I invite all interested to do business to invest and to visit Ethiopia.

As a result of the implementation of rural development, industrial development and other sectoral policies and strategies, agricultural and industrial production, and export trade are growing steadily from year to vear, both in terms of variety and volume. Between 2005 and

2011, the country's real gross domestic product (GDP) grew by 11 percent per annum, with the service sector accounting for the highest growth (15 percent), agriculture for more than 8 percent and industrial development 10 percent. This growth is greatly contributed by a 15 percent expansion of agricultural land and a 40 percent yield increase, significantly improved infrastructure, increased foreign investment from less than \$820 million in 2007/08 to more than \$2 billion in the first half of the 2010/11 fiscal year. In terms of export expansion, the volume of Ethiopian exports doubled in the last five years. It is expected to be doubled in the coming five years. Trade ties with Japan in terms of the volume of trade is expanding every year. Ethiopian coffee, cut flowers, sesame, leather and agricultural products are getting more demand in Japan's market.

Both the government and the International Monetary Fund expect Ethiopia's economy to continue as one of the world's fastest growing over the coming vears. Participants of the World Economic Forum (WEF) on Africa, which was successfully held in Ethiopia early this month, applauded Ethiopia for its achievement in registering a high rate of economic growth and accelerating social development.

Climate change has become the greatest challenge in which African countries are more prone to its adverse consequences. Ethiopia plays a key role in adopting common positions for Africa in international climate change negotiations. Ethiopia's Climate Resilient Green Economy (CRGE) strategy is the indicator of Ethiopia's commitment to contribute toward sustainable development and a stable global environment. Ethiopia is the first African country to announce a zero-emission strategy for the year 2025. Harnessing more reliable and clean energy is one of the CRGE targets. The launching of the construction of Renaissance Dam on the Nile, which would generate 6,000 megawatts, sought to play a key role in transforming the Ethiopian industrialization process in generating clean energy.
