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

He quoted from Lord Buddha's teachings and convinced the world that hatred cannot be overcome by hatred, but only by love and compassion.

Following this initiative, Japan took tenacious and resolute courses of action toward postwar reconstruction. It is most heartening to note that many people in Japan still remember this occasion with a sense of gratitude. This paved the way for the establishment of diplomatic relations between Sri Lanka and Japan in 1952. Sri Lanka stood by Japan because we were of the conviction that Japan had the inner strength to revive from its devastation. This boundless strength of the peoples of Japan would, one day, become a beacon of promise, hope and opportunity, leading to what would be an economic powerhouse not only in Asia but in the entire world. I must further add that what our forefathers foresaw, then, has become a reality.

In 2013, His Excellency Mahinda Rajapaksa, president of Sri Lanka, undertook a four-day official visit to Japan. During this Emperor and the prime minister of Japan as well as met with the most senior political spectrum of the country, thus further deepening and strengthening the bilateral relations between the two countries. Last year was unique since an unprecedented number of high level visits from both countries took place, which in turn, widened and strengthened the relations.

Today, Japan is the single-largest donor country to Sri Lanka and has always stood by Sri Lanka in good times and in testing times; a friend in need, we say, is a friend indeed. In international forums, Japan has always supported our cause and looked towards the fundamental interests of Sri Lanka as a sovereign democracy. Japan was also one of the first countries to assist Sri

Lanka when the Indian Ocean tsunami struck the island in 2004. In the same manner when the Great East Japan Earthquake struck in 2011, the government of Sri Lanka was quick to assist Japan in every possible way.

Sri Lanka is currently one of the safest places in the world, with permanent peace, security and harmony for all its citizens. Similar to Japan in its postwar era, Sri Lanka also believes that our country and its peoples have the inner strength to emerge and unleash a new era and a new chapter, paving the way to lead the future of South Asia as well as Asia

Tourist arrivals from Japan to Sri Lanka have increased by 21% in 2013 compared to 2012. Japan is among the highest tourist-generating countries in the East Asian region. Sri Lanka, being a safe haven for the Japanese travelers seeking a "power spot" and a peaceful location for inner revival, among others, is highly sought after by tourists of Japan.

In addition, the large corporates of Japan have expressed interest to commit investments and to be engaged in commercial and trading activity with Sri Lanka, which is today a booming business hub in South Asia. With the 5-hub concept introduced under the visionary leadership of the president of Sri Lanka, the country is, today, a booming maritime hub, aviation hub, commercial hub, knowledge hub, energy hub and tourism hub in South Asia. I am confident these developments and evolvements would further deepen and strengthen the economic, commercial and investment relations between our two

I look forward with confidence and optimism to the enduring friendship between Sri Lanka and Japan, being further enhanced and augmented in the coming years, and to strengthening and deepening of relations between our two countries.
