TICAD V was an example of the revitalization of the . Japan-Africa relationship. During TICAD V Kikwete and Abe had the opportunity to meet and discuss ways of further advancing the relationship between Tanzania and Japan.

Tanzania have visited Japan to meet with their counterparts in an effort to maintain forward momentum.

On the occasion of our National Day, we reflect on our continued achievements, both at home and in our relationship with the rest of the world. I would like to mention some of laudable progress that has been realized in political, economic social, and international relations spheres.



On the political front, Tanzania continued to enjoy peace and political stability, while democracy continues to take root and basic freedoms, human rights and rule of law continued to be respected and observed. As an important milestone in expression of a true democracy, Kikwete in May 2012, created a national commission, which was mandated to collect public opinion on the review of the Constitution of Tanzania. Currently a special session of the parliament is in session reviewing the second draft of the constitution. Once this session is over the draft shall be sent back to the people through a referendum and if approved by the end of this year the United Republic of Tanzania will have a new Constitution, which we tions in 2015.

Economically, Tanzania continued sound performance despite the global economic downturns in 2011. The economy recorded a growth rate of 6.5 percent in 2013 compared with 6.8 percent in 2012, with the driving forces for growth being the mining, tourism and manufacturing sectors. The performance in investment was also good, whereby investment projects worth \$19.6 bil-lion were registered in 2012 compared with \$7.1 billion the year before. The government continues to work to create an attractive business environment, including measures to reduce the cost of doing business, to attract both foreign and domestic investors.

However, the encouraging

progress in Tanzania's macroeconomic success did not reduce poverty significantly, because sectors which contributed to growth do not create nities, Tanzanian economy can Operate-Transfer the majority, particularly those living in rural areas and relying mainly on agriculture. In addressing this challenge the government of Tanzania continues to give due attention to agricultural development promotion through implementa-tion of "Kilimo Kwanza" (Agriculture First). Agriculture First aims at involving the private sector, development partners and small holder farmers in bringing a transformation in agriculture by resolving the

issue of low productivity. The importance of roads and other infrastructure that connect agricultural production areas to markets and industrial centers is part of our concern. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the government of Japan for their continued support in construction of road infrastructure, as well as in the agriculture sector.

As for investment opportuvestment in every conceivable area. Plenty of opportunities exist in sectors such as agriculture, energy, infrastructure, transportation, tourism, mining, manufacturing and services. The discovery of huge reserves of natural gas both onshore and offshore has heightened expectations of the country becoming a major gasproducer.


The government has prepared several strategic plans to handle the huge foreign investment inflow expected in gas subsector projects, which include liquefied petroleum gas production, piped and compressed natural gas, fertilizers, petrochemical production, etc.

Regarding infrastructure, the government of Tanzania has developed policies and

legislation for the private sector to engage in building and operating roads and the energy infrastructure under Build-Build-Own-Operate-Transfer (BOOT) systems.

As ambassador to Japan, I

would like to see more Japanese investment in Tanzania, particularly in the areas highlighted above. Tanzania's comparative advantages as a premier investment destination include: a stable political environment; strong economic performance; unlimited inopportunities; attractive investment incentives; a vibrant private sector; a pro-business government; a huge regional market, preferential access to some of the world's markets; and geographic location — as it borders the six landlocked countries of Rwanda, Burundi, Uganda, Zambia, Malawi and **CONTINUED ON PAGE 5**




— the largest and the deepest lakes in Africa, respectively; and Zanzibar, the island of spices; to name only a few attractions.
