Sustainable peace


Malawi continues to register positive strides in other areas, including sustainable peace, stability and good governance.

Socially, Malawi has enjoyed success in maintaining peace despite having more than 17 tribes and languages, different religions and over 20 political parties. Malawi has never experienced a civil war.

Malawians are free in exercising their right to join any political group or religion. Additionally, various religious groups pray together in some national interdenominational programs. The country is also benefiting from religious institutions through the different social obligations they provide, especially in hospitals and schools that accept all Malawians regardless of faith.

Since 1994, when Malawi adopted a multiparty democracy, the country has managed to hold peaceful elections that have seen the systematic transfer of power. The recent victory of Mutharika as the fifth President of Malawi following the May 20 general elections is a clear testimony of continued democracy and respect for Malawi's Constitution and the rule of law.

The country has a legal framework that maintains human rights through the establishment of human rights watch institutions such as the Office of the Ombudsman and the Anti-Corruption Bureau and the Human Rights Commission to provide checks and balances on the government and the public. There has also been growth in the freedom enjoyed by both print and electronic media.

Malawi has made great strides in the education sector. The introduction of free primary education has increased the enrollment of students, resulting in higher literacy levels. The country has also seen improvements in provisions for higher education with many institutions providing accredited degrees and diploma courses from both local and international boards.

tination for tourists from all over the world and has several UNESCO World Heritage sites such as Lake Malawi National Park and the Chongoni Rock-Art Area. The country is accessible by land, air and sea and continues to be a favorable destination for many tourists.


Malawi-Japan relations
