It is my very great honor to extend, on behalf of the government and people of Jamaica, warm and convivial greetings to Their Imperial Majesties, Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko, the Imperial family, Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and the government and people of Japan on this, the 53rd anniversary of Jamaica's Independence.

Over the past five decades, Jamaica, which has a population similar in size to Hiroshima Prefecture, has managed to make an impact upon the world that is disproportionate to its diminutive size. Our musical forms of ska, reggae and dancehall, as well as our culinary specialties such as jerk chicken and jerk pork, have

which were gold, at the last two Summer Olympic Games. Jamaica has medaled at every Olympiad since Independence in 1962 with the ironic exception of the 1964 Tokyo Games; something we certainly hope to rectify in 2020!

Of course, any success that Jamaica has realized has come by the gargantuan effort of our most valuable resource, our people. It is through their creativity, innovation, talent, intellect, faith, determination and strength that Jamaica has been able to forge ahead, sometimes through great difficulty, in its growth as a nation. Notably, as it has been since the time of colonialism and slavery of centuries past, the women of Jamaica have contributed significantly to the construction and reputation of the nation. Jamaica in-

stituted universal suffrage in 1944, 18 years before Independence and, since then, women have continuously contributed in every field of endeavor, commercial and public, to the nation's leadership and development. In fact, in 2014 the International Labor Organization listed Jamaica (at 59.3 percent) as the country with the highest percentage of women in management positions worldwide. We strongly believe in the value of women's participation in nation building and economic expansion, and are enthusiastic about encouraging our friends and neighbors to pursue similar national strategies as we collectively seek to create a more stable and more productive world.

In this regard, the embassy was privileged to collaborate with Showa Women's Univer-

sity, Tokyo in December in the organization of a Women's Empowerment Symposium featuring the Jamaican's Minister of State of Industry, Investment and Commerce, the Honorable Sharon Ffolkes Abrahams, who exhorted the young women in attendance to strive for significant participation in the social, cultural, academic, political and economic affairs of Japan. People-to-people exchanges such as this have greatly helped to undergird the warm and friendly ties which Jamaica and Japan mutually enjoy.

Perhaps the most enduring example of our ongoing people-to-people collaborations lies in the steadily growing engagement of Jamaican professionals in the Japan Exchange and Teaching Program. Many Jamaicans have shared their knowledge, skills and friend-

ship with Japanese students (currently across 35 prefectures) and, through this process, continue to help nurture the mutually beneficial relationship our two nations celebrate. velopment, the significant bilateral visits made by high-level governmental delegations, or the keen attention Japanese artists and aficionados exhibit for Jamaican music and dance, it all heralds the dynamic, burgeoning people-driven relations which so deeply profit both countries. As Jamaica celebrates its 53rd anniversary of Independence, I take this opportunity to thank the people of Japan for the sincere friendship they have extended to the people of Jamaica over these many years and pray that God will continue to bless our strong, heartfelt relations.
