Shared values bind multifaceted ties

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May 17 is Norway's Constitution Day, celebrating the signing of our constitution in 1814, 208 years ago. Since its inception, our constitution has enshrined the principles of democracy,

rule of law and human rights — values that unite our nation and define what it means to be Norwegian.

These values are also a strong foundation for the bilateral relationship between Japan and Norway. Both our countries stand firm in the defense of rule of law and human rights, of a peaceful and stable global order, against forces who through aggression or coercion are trying to change the status quo to their own benefit. The unlawful and unjustified war in Ukraine is a glaring violation of everything we stand for. We deeply appreciate Japan's strong support for

Ukraine, and solidarity with its democratic partners in Europe.

Our shared values are also the basis for the political cooperation between Norway and Japan. We are both staunch multilateralists, cooperating in the United Nations and in other multilateral fora for improved global governance, human rights, human security and sustainable development. For Norway, as a current member of the U.N. Security Council, Japan's support and insights into many conflict situations have been invaluable, and we look forward to continuing this cooperation when Japan enters the council.

In business and science, our bilateral relationship is shaped by both countries being innovation-driven knowledge economies, and perhaps most of all by both being large ocean economies, with strong historical, social and cultural ties to the sea. Shipping, maritime technologies and marine industries are at the heart of our business partnerships, while ocean and Arctic research is the fulcrum of our long-standing scientific cooperation.

A common commitment to sustainability, fighting climate change and achieving zero carbon emissions is also an overarching objective for much of what Norway and Japan do together in business and research. Clean energy — offshore wind, hydrogen,
