On behalf of the government and people of the Maldives, I express my sincere appreciation to the government of Japan for the invaluable support and cooperation extended to us in our efforts in combating the COVID-19 pandemic and reiterate our commitment to deepening our long-standing bilateral friendship in the coming years. Maldives gained its independence on July 26, 1965, and ever since then the republic has been committed to building upon its accomplishments, including our transition from one of the poorest countries in the world to a middle-income country. As a small island state, Maldives has been extremely vulnerable to environmental challenges. Nevertheless, under the leadership of President Ibrahim Mohamed Solih and his renewed commitment to sustainable development under the "blue economy" policy, Maldives has prioritized human rights issues and implemented institutional reforms for democratic governance, women's empowerment and advancing the climate agenda. Maldives is also re-engaging with our international partners and making significant progress in

the U.N.'s Human Development Index.

Today I am very proud to highlight that despite all the developmental challenges and being one of the smallest countries in the world, last year Maldives set an example by winning the election for the presidency of the 76th session of the United Nations General Assembly by our Foreign Minister H.E. Abdulla Shahid, on its first attempt. The victory means Shahid will be only the sixth president from a small island developing state to preside over the General Assembly in the history of the U.N.

Despite the adverse impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the global economy, the timely and vigilant steps taken by the president have allowed the government to sustain the tourism sector while ensuring precautions against infection. Today, the government is accelerating efforts to recover, rebuild and restore tourism as the pandemic wanes. As part of this effort to reassure world markets, Maldives remains open with one of the most accommodative border policies in the world and remains one of the safest destinations for tourists to enjoy.
