Important partnership built on shared values, similarities

On Aug. 14, 1947, Pakistan became an independent and sovereign nation-state. Today we pay homage to the Founder of the Nation Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah, poet of

the East Allama Muhammad Iqbal and all the other great leaders of the Pakistan Independence Movement who paved the way for the creation of Pakistan.

On the auspicious occasion of the Independence Day of Pakistan, let me express on behalf of the government of Pakistan, myself and my compatriots in Japan, our respectful and sincere greetings to their imperial majesties the emperor and empress, members of the imperial family, H.E. Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, the government and the friendly people of Japan.

Since its independence, Pakistan has always approached the countries of the world as fraternal nations with a desire for lasting peace, friendship and mutual respect for sovereignty. This approach is strongly linked to the ideology that crystallized during our independence movement.

Diplomatic relations between Pakistan and Japan were established on April 28, 1952. It is a relationship based on mutual respect and understanding and is characterized by a shared sense of history and common perceptions on important issues. In the current scenario, Pakistan and Japan

share a fundamental desire to propagate peace and support for all the members of the international community.

Linkages between the peoples of our countries date back to prehistoric times. The Gandhara and Indus Valley civilizations and the cotton trade were some of the oldest means of contact between our countries. This rich history represents a shared legacy between our countries, and much of it remains to be discovered and understood.

Pakistan has always looked at Japan with a sense of respect as a very important country in Asia whose economic success is a model that we wish to emulate. We appreciate the fact that the Japanese people are kind, progressive and family-centric. They have a lot of similarities with the people of Pakistan.

Our relations have gone from strength to strength over more than 70 decades. We are also seeing increasing cooperation at various levels of engagement. The successful visit of then-Foreign Minister Bilawal Bhutto Zardari added another layer to our already strong ties.

The bedrock of our relationship, though, has been economic, with Japan being a key development partner, major investor and significant export destination for Pakistan. Our economic cooperation and engagement has been picking up in the last few years. The recent Pakistan Investment Seminar co-organized in Tokyo by the governments of Pakistan and Japan was heavily attended, signifying renewed Japanese interest in investing in Pakistan.

Japanese investment in Pakistan has entered a new phase in current times. An investment worth \$100 million was announced by Toyota in the field of hybrid automotive manufacturing in 2023. A large investment was also made by Morinaga Milk, denoting renewed interest in the Pakistani market while also ascertaining its potential.

Japanese assistance has been of monumental importance to Pakistan. Japan was the first country to deliver COVID-19 diagnostic kits to Pakistan and also provided \$7.4 million for pandemic relief through international organizations. In January 2021, Japan provided a grant of \$4.57 million for the procurement of an oral polio vaccine via an agreement signed between the Japan International Cooperation Agency and UNICEF.

In recent years, JICA has been assisting with the installation of weather surveillance radars to mitigate damage caused by natural disasters. Such radars have already been established in Islamabad and Karachi and one will soon be established in Multan. In January 2021, JICA announced a grant of around \$19 million for the installation of a weather surveillance radar in Sukkur. These radars cover more than 90% of Pakistan.

In the wake of Pakistan's economic downturn from the pandemic, the government of Japan under the Debt Service Suspension Initiative in 2020 suspended about \$327 million in debt payments due from Pakistan.


Defense relations between our countries remain robust and strong. Based on strong foundations, they have grown from strength to strength. Their present scope is characterized by a strong mutual trust and reliability. Our cultural linkages are further cemented by regular people-to-people

exchanges encouraged by both sides.

I would also like to highlight the major contribution of the Pakistani diaspora in Japan. Our community in Japan is among the pioneers in exporting used automobiles, the carpet trade and halal food. They remain important contributors to the Japanese economy. We are working with our Japanese friends to promote the export of skilled manpower from Pakistan to Japan.

We should endeavor to carry forward the excellent momentum in our relations to the years ahead and forge new partnerships in multiple fields. We are also confident that through our joint efforts our fraternal ties and cooperative relations will acquire further depth in the years to come, to the mutual benefit of our two peoples and regional peace and prosperity.

Long live the Pakistan-Japan friendship!
