I am delighted that the vibrant and diverse program of the Tokyo parade in Omotesando and the Green Ireland Festival in Yoyogi Park combine to represent the oldest and largest annual St. Patrick's Day celebration in Asia.

Beyond Tokyo, lively community groups, marching bands, parades and the illumination of landmarks in green from from Sapporo to Kumamoto and Yokohama to Matsue, Shimane Prefecture, will bring the Irish spirit to cities across Japan.

These events are a testament to the hard work and dedication of the Irish community, friends and the volunteers who make them possible. Without a doubt, Japan is one of the best places in the world to celebrate St. Patrick's Day!

As a small, highly open trading economy with a strong global outlook. Ireland is committed to the value of an open and fair trading system. Free and fair trade brings economic opportunities, creates well-paid jobs, fosters innovation and builds economic resilience — essential for small states like Ireland to thrive and prosper.

Commitment to shared values and the rules-based international order makes Japan Ireland's most important partner in Asia. This is particularly true of economic relations, and trade and investment. The benefits from our economic ties flow in both directions to our mutual benefit. Two-way trade between Japan and Ireland now exceeds €22 billion (¥3.5 trillion). This is a result of the economic compatibility between Ireland and Japan in the fields of information and communications technology, life sciences, financial services, fintech, and the green economy.

Foreign direct investment from Japanese companies into Ireland continues to grow. These investments come in the areas of semiconductors, technology services, financial services and medical technology. We welcome the fact that Japanese companies continue to establish and expand operations in Ireland.

Ireland and Japan share a deep commitment to international peace and security, and a rules-based multilateral system. Last month we marked the third anniversary of Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Ireland's message is clear — we stand in solidarity with Ukraine, now and in the future. We believe we have taken a principled position in the Middle East, too. We firmly condemn the attack by Hamas on Israel on Oct. 7, 2023. We call for the return of all hostages to their families. In Gaza, it is vital that we do not see a resumption of hostilities, and that the massive scale-up of desperately needed humanitarian aid continues.

There are undoubtedly deep and complex challenges to navigate over the months
