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On Aug. 6, the Plurinational State of Bolivia celebrates its bicentennial — marking 200 years of independence. These two centuries have been shaped by the enduring struggles of the Bolivian people

and 126 years since the first Japanese immigrants arrived in Bolivia. The story of the Japanese-Bolivian community is one of successful integration and mutual enrichment, with generations of Nikkei families contributing to Bolivian society while maintaining cultural ties to Japan.

As a plurinational state, Bolivia draws strength from its cultural diversity. On this bicentennial, Bolivia reaffirms its commitment to building bridges with the world — especially with Japan, a nation with which it shares a long-standing and fruitful friendship.

On this occasion, warmest greetings are extended to Their Majesties Emperor Naruhito and Empress Masako, the government and the people of Japan, and to all Bolivians residing in Japan.
