Malaysia National Day Special

Working together to uphold regional peace and stability

Aug. 31 marks the 68th anniversary of Malaysia's National Day, a moment for Malaysians worldwide to celebrate their nation with pride and gratitude, regardless of background.

This year also commemorates the 68th anniversary of diplomatic relations between Malaysia and Japan. Under the theme "Malaysia Madani Rakyat Disantuni" ("People Cared For"), the occasion underscores the government's commitment to the welfare of its people, in line with the Madani aspiration that champions unity, prosperity and inclusivity.

Over the decades, Malaysia and Japan have enjoyed a strong and multifaceted partnership. Our cooperation spans many sectors, including economic relations, science and technology, tourism, education and people-to-people exchanges. The 1982 Look East Policy was the basis for this partnership. In 2023, our relationship was elevated to a comprehensive and strategic partnership, unlocking fresh opportunities for closer and broader collaboration.

This year, the commitment to strengthening bilateral ties was further demonstrated by Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba's official visit to Malaysia. Marking his first official overseas trip since taking office in October 2024, the occasion highlighted Japan's determination to deepen engagement with Malaysia and reaffirmed its standing as one of Malaysia's most valued partners.

In 2024, bilateral trade reached \$34 billion, dominated by liquefied natural gas and the electrical and electronics sector. Agricultural trade surged by 43.4%, rising from \$488 million in 2023 to \$700 million in 2024, fueled largely by demand for palm oil and palm oil-based products. Similarly, Malaysia's halal

exports reached \$825 million, up 32.9% from \$621 million the previous year.

Japan remains one of Malaysia's top 10 investors, contributing \$1.02 billion in sectors such as electrical and electronics, machinery and equipment, chemicals, and services. Japan also ranked as the third-largest foreign investor in terms of implemented manufacturing projects. As of 2024, a total of 2,838 manufacturing projects with Japanese participation have been implemented with a total investment worth \$30.54 billion. These projects have generated employment for 344,996 people.

Looking forward, opportunities for Japanese businesses are poised to grow under the 13th Malaysia Plan (2026 to 2030), recently tabled by Prime Minister Dato' Seri Anwar Ibrahim. This \$144 billion socioeconomic road map aspires for Malaysia to become a high-income nation by 2030 and to lead Southeast Asia in artificial intelligence, digital technology and renewable energy. Malaysia stands ready to serve as a strategic springboard for Japanese companies seeking to expand their footprint in Southeast Asia.

Malaysia has also made a strong impression at the Osaka Expo. The Malaysia Pavilion has secured potential trade and investment worth \$3.24 billion, surpassing its initial target of \$3 billion. The pavilion has also drawn more than 2.5 million visitors, well above the projected 1.5 million. These milestones underscore the strong global interest in Malaysia's strengths, opportunities and achievements. With the expo continuing until October, Malaysia is poised to project its vision, growth and global competitiveness.

As a leading regional hub for education, Malaysia continues to be a popular study-abroad destination for Japanese students, attracting those pursuing university degrees, as well as participants on educational trips. The establishment of the University of Tsukuba, Malaysia in Kuala Lumpur is expected to further increase these numbers, offering Japanese students

enhanced access to high-quality academic programs in a multicultural setting, supported by English-language instruction.

Tourist arrivals from Japan surged to 367,182 in 2024, a 32.2% increase over the previous year. As Malaysia prepares to launch the Visit Malaysia Year 2026 campaign under the tagline "Surreal Experiences," the country hopes to welcome 47 million international visitors and generate \$78 billion in tourism receipts.

On the regional stage, Malaysia's leadership as chair of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations this year underscores its pivotal role in fostering regional stability and cooperation. Guided by the theme "Inclusivity and Sustainability," Malaysia strives to ensure no one is left behind while charting ASEAN's shared future through the ASEAN Community Vision 2045.

This same spirit of collaboration is reflected in over 50 years of ASEAN-Japan relations. In an era of global uncertainty, partnerships with trusted and like-minded nations are more vital than ever. Malaysia stands ready to work alongside Japan to uphold regional stability, security and prosperity, and looks forward to welcoming world leaders to the 47th ASEAN Summit in Kuala Lumpur in October.

Looking ahead, Malaysia presents a wealth of opportunities as a preferred trade and investment partner for Japanese businesses, while further strengthening ties. I also invite everyone to visit Malaysia during the VMY 2026 to experience the country's rich cultural heritage, breathtaking landscapes and world-class attractions.

On this auspicious occasion, I wish all Malaysians and friends of Malaysia in Japan *Selamat Hari Kebangsaan ke-68* (Happy 68th National Day). May this celebration strengthen our unity, deepen our partnerships and inspire continued progress for our nation.
