Taking steps toward cooperation in green energy

On Oct. 24, as Zambia celebrates her 61st independence anniversary, I extend warm greetings from President Hakainde Hichilema to their majesties the emperor and empress of Japan

and to the Japanese people.

On this day, we also celebrate 61 years of enduring diplomatic relations with Japan, a partnership built on shared values of peace, democracy and sustainable development. This friendship has flourished through mutual respect and understanding and deepened through cooperation.

In 2025, high-level engagements, led by Hichilema and Vice President Mutale Nalumango, reaffirmed both nations' commitment to mutual growth, prosperity and collaboration on investment, trade, technology and human development.

In his official visit to Japan in February, Hichilema met with then-Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba for a summit that show-cased Zambia's dedication to a transparent, private-sector-led economy that encourages innovation and sustainable growth.

Meanwhile, Ishiba reaffirmed Japan's commitment to supporting Zambia's reform agenda and commended Hichilema for his debt restructuring and fiscal reforms, which have restored macroeconomic stability.

Both leaders agreed to strengthen collab-

oration in mining, renewable energy, education and health, while emphasizing support for a rules-based international order and global financial reform to ensure fair access to capital for developing countries.

The visit also saw the signing of a key memorandum cementing bilateral relations, and an agreement on the promotion and protection of investment. This agreement provides a framework to attract and safeguard Japanese investment in Zambia while promoting equitable, transparent and sustainable economic relations.

The visit came against the backdrop of Japan's earlier pledge of \$1.5 billion in 2024 to support Japanese private-sector investment in Zambia's mining industry. In the president's meetings with major corporations, Toyota Tsusho expressed renewed interest in solar power and electric vehicle battery projects in Zambia, signaling a concrete step toward renewable energy cooperation and green industrialization.

In his address at the Zambia-Japan Business Forum in Tokyo, attended by more than 100 Japanese companies, the president emphasized that Zambia is open for business and committed to building a private sector that drives sustainable growth, creates jobs and uplifts livelihoods.

The president also met with Emperor Naruhito at the Imperial Palace in Tokyo. This meeting symbolized the strong cultural and historical bonds that continue to define Zambia-Japan relations.

Building on this momentum, the vice president represented Zambia at the ninth Tokyo International Conference on African Development in Yokohama in August, where she highlighted Zambia's peace, political stability and investor-friendly policies. She also reaffirmed Zambia's commitment to the African Union's Agenda 2063 and the United Nations sustainable development goals, emphasizing women's empowerment, human capital development and sustainable industrial growth.

On the sidelines of TICAD 9, the vice president held meetings with industry

leaders to discuss cooperation in renewable energy and industrial diversification.

As Zambia and Japan celebrate 61 years of friendship and cooperation, both nations look ahead to a future defined by shared prosperity and innovation. From renewable energy to digital transformation and manufacturing, the partnership continues to evolve anchored in trust, mutual respect and the creation of opportunities for the next generation.


