Strong ties, mutual experiences mark friendly relationship

On the occasion of the 35th National Day of the Republic of the Marshall Islands, it is with great pleasure and pride that I extend, on behalf of H.E. President Christopher J. Loeak, the government and people of the RMI, a warm greeting of lakwe and best wishes to Their Imperial Majesties, Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko, Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and the government and people of



Japan.

It has been one year since I first took up the post of ambassador to Japan. Over that time, although it is a very short period to accomplish much, I am proud to have witnessed and been a part of the undertakings and exchanges between my country and Japan that have forged yet an even closer relationship.

In commemoration of 25 years since the establishment of diplomatic relations with Japan, Loeak and his wife made an official visit to Japan at the invitation of Prime Minister Shinzo Abe this past December. During the visit, Loeak and his wife had the distinguished honor and privilege of a royal

audience with Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko followed by talks with Abe to discuss issues of mutual interest to the two countries.

On both occasions, Loeak told both the Imperial Couple and Abe that although diplomatic relations were formally established only 25 years ago, our countries' relationship dates back further to 1914 when Japan took over the administration of our islands, which resulted in a good number of Marshallese-Japanese descendants today.

Further strengthening our bond, when a strong typhoon hit our capital city in 1918, Emperor Taisho graciously provided relief funds to assist the

Marshallese affected by the typhoon. After the typhoon, the Japanese government (Imperial) aid fund also contributed to replanting coconut plantations on Majuro Atoll. A monument to the imperial graciousness was erected on November 14, 1919, to commemorate the Imperial favors for future generations.

Since the first encounter between the people of the RMI and Japan, we have continued to enjoy close and vibrant relations through historical ties and have maintained a close bond of friendship. The RMI and Japan share a similar nuclear legacy, especially the people of Bikini Atoll, Enewetak Atoll, Rongelap Atoll and Utrik Atoll

with the people of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Our islands were used as nuclear test sites for the United States in the 1940s and 1950s, and more than a half a century later, our people are still haunted by the fateful events.

We have and will continue to participate in the Nagasaki and Hiroshima peace and memorial ceremonies to demonstrate that we stand together with the people of Japan and understand fully the magnitude of the painful events of the 0.bombings in Hiroshima and Nagasaki many decades ago. This year marks the 60th anniversary of the nuclear testing in my country and, as a nation who shares a similar fate with

Japan, Loeak's recent wreath laying at the Hiroshima Peace Memorial clearly signifies our solidarity with the victims and families of the atomic bombs in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, as well as the nuclear incident in Fukushima, and reinforces our support and efforts toward the total elimination of nuclear weapons.

Japan will always be considered a true friend and development partner of the RMI. The development assistance provided by Japan over the years in the areas of natural disaster response; environment and climate change; sustainable development; and human security such as health and education, have contributed

tremendously to our growth and progress.

Japan's recent contribution to the 44th Pacific Islands Forum Leaders' Meeting we hosted, its high level of representatives at the Forum as well as the 60th anniversary of the U.S. nuclear tests in the RMI, and most importantly, its recent commitment to the Majuro Declaration on Climate Leadership all signify the value that Japan puts into this relationship. In reciprocity, my government

will continue to support Japan's endeavors in the international arena, most especially in its aspiration to become a permanent

member of the U.N. Security Council.

In closing, I wish to convey my sincerest gratitude and renew my personal commitment to working closely with the government of Japan in furthering the cordial relations between our countries for the mutual benefit of both our people as we embark on 25 years of friendship and cooperation. I hope that the establishment of sister cities between the Marshall Islands local councils and Japan's local governments will further strengthen this bond. May the good Lord continue to bless the Republic of the Marshall Islands and Japan!
