Why would it be a wise decision to invest in Croatia? We have competitive operational costs and good return on investment, attractive tax incentives and easy access to all of Europe by air, sea, rivers and a network of highways and railways. We are particularly proud of our talented, efficient, innovative, highly qualified and multilingual workforce. There is a pro-business environment with domestic and foreign companies doing business under equal conditions. There are a number of business zones available for green field investments. Croatia

has a long industrial tradition in many sectors complemented by the rapid development of new technologies. Japan has world-leading technologies in a number of areas and a well-deserved image of making superb quality products. Taking all of this into account we believe it would be beneficial for both sides to see

more Japanese investment in our country.

Currently our main exports to Japan are bluefin tuna, timber, wine, olive oil, as well as some chemical and pharmaceutical products. We have much more to offer to the sophisticated and demanding Japanese market.

to see an increasing number of Japanese tourists visiting Croatia and vice versa. Our guests are regularly coming back and are not seen only as costumers, but also as friends.

Besides its high-quality prod-

ucts Japan is well represented in Croatia by the widespread popularity of haiku, aikido, kendo and *kyudo* Japanese archery. Have we exhausted the possibilities in our relationship? Of course not!
