On the occasion of our nation's 26th birthday, Sept. 8, I am delighted to extend warm wishes to all Macedonians residing in Japan, and to express heartfelt gratitude to their

Imperial Majesties Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko, the government and people of Japan.

Guided by the will of further strengthening the bilateral ties established in 1994, the Republic of Macedonia opened an embassy in Tokyo in May 2013. This year, Japan responded by establishing its embassy in Skopje and appointing its first resident Ambassador to the Republic of Macedonia, H.E. Keiko Haneda.

I would like to express my satisfaction with the upward development trend of the bilateral relations and to highlight the continuous multilateral and bilateral support.

Last year, we saw several new milestones in the parliamentary, academic, scientific and economic relationship. The first and most crucial milestone we achieved was the formation of the Diet's Japan-Macedonia Parliamentary League, which had its inaugural meeting on Dec. 17.

Fostering relations in the academic field is among our priorities and it resulted in the signing of several memorandums of understanding (MOUs) between Macedonian universities and prominent Japanese institutions. Among the most noteworthy are the agreement between the Hydro biological Institute-Ohrid and the Lake Biwa Museum of Japan and the agreement between Macedonian Academy of Sciences and Art and the Slavic-Eurasian

Research Center of Hokkaido University. We also had several doctors from Macedonia visit Japan to participate in medical training at Japanese hospitals, based on previously signed memorandums of cooperation.

Macedonia is multiethnic, democratic, safe and a country leader in economic reforms in the Balkan region. The country is among those that have the lowest taxes in the world, and last year in the Ease of Doing Business report from the World Bank it was ranked 10th in the world and fifth in Europe, providing an excellent environment for foreign investors.

In order to promote these incentives we signed MOUs with the Japan Institute for Overseas Investment, and organized business forums for small and medium sized enterprises, presenting the country's investment benefits. I'm especially proud of the increased number of Japanese tourists last year, despite the migrant crisis and other safety issues associated with the region. Japanese tour operators are discovering that Macedonia is a very safe country and has tremendous touristic potential ranging from rock climbing and mountain tourism, to wine tourism and eco tourism. Known as the birthplace of Mother Theresa and one of the earliest Christian countries in the world, Macedonia is also a magnet for religious tourism.

I invite all the readers of The Japan Times to visit this ancient country with its timeless beauty and experience the synergy of natural beauty, historical treasures and excellent food and wines.
