Togo, which makes the culture of peace a fundamental link in its foreign policy, has formed and kept friendly and cooperative relations with all nations. The diversity and quality of our multilateral exchanges are clear indicators of the vitality of cooperation for stability, peace and development.

Internally, the objective pursued by the government is that of great achievements on the path of common destiny. Also, through the Strategy of Accelerated Growth and Promotion of Employment, which covered the period between 2013 and 2017, the improvement of living conditions and the diversification of state support mechanisms to the most vulnerable strata have remained at the heart of constant concern.

To give more access to training adapted to the potential of the country and the potential of young people, the government, in line with the pillars of the Tokyo International Conference for African Development (TICAD), has



Thus, 10 training institutes for development will be created over the next five years in the fields of agriculture, logistics, building, transport and digital technology.

These projects will contribute to finding solutions for the empowerment and economic inclusion of young people, especially women.

As our president has so well noted, the successes achieved and the pursuit of other challenges will only be reached in peace and through permanent dialogue.

These different measures are perfectly in line with Togo's new development policy.

At the end of the implementation of the Strategy of Accelerated Growth and Employment Promotion, which expired last year, Togo chose to pursue its development policy, medium-term economic and social development through the National Development Plan, based on the social project of the head of state. This project is reflected in the government's general policy statement and in the



commitments undertaken by Togo at community, continental and international levels in relation with the Economic Community of West African States 2020 vision, the TICAD process, the African Union Agenda 2063 and the U.N.'s Sustainable Development Goals.

This new National Development Plan has three main axes: the first is setting up a logistics hub of excellence for international trade accompanying the development of a first-rate business center, and the second is creating jobs through the development of agricultural processing, manufacturing and extractive industries. The third axis aims to see the consolidation of social development and strengthening the mechanisms of inclusion.

Togo will continue to count on the support of Japan for the successful implementation of its National Development Plan.

To conclude, I would like to express my sincerest thanks to The Japan Times for the opportunity to address its distinguished readers and celebrate our independence day, highlighting the depth and the strength of Togo-Japan friendly relations. I am also humbly indebted to our sponsors, whose generosity has made this supplement possible.
