I am confident that Belarus, as a dedicated member or participant of various regional organizations and economic initiatives, including the Eurasian Economic Union, the European Union Eastern Partnership and the Belt and Road initiative. provides its current and potential partners in Japan with unique opportunities in trade, logistics and expertise on regional developments, to name just a few. In turn, being the world's third-largest economy and one of the major players in the Asia-Pacific region and

globally, Japan is a country Belarus is interested in having stable, friendly and resultsoriented relations with.

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Belarusian and Japanese business counterparts are continuously engaged in capitalizing on established trade channels and identifying new possibilities for cooperation. Additionally, I find current trends, such as the recent establishment of a business club, which assembles entrepreneurs from the two countries seeking closer bilateral trade ties, promising and timely.

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought a new level of uncertainty into our lives, but it also stimulates the rethinking of our assessment of what, for a long time, seemed to be permanent.

The global disease has shown how united

and compassionate the international community can be in the face of a common threat. However, it also demonstrated how fragile the globalized world is. It made us learn the hard way that not a single achievement in bilateral and multilateral relations can be taken for granted or regarded as conventional. This is actually a good thing, as the pandemic has vividly underscored that every partnership is to be appreciated and cultivated while searching for and discovering new opportunities for cooperation should become a priority.

Belarus considers the Asia-Pacific region a dynamically evolving and economically robust region; the country looks forward to further diversifying its ties with Japan in various areas, including politics, commerce. collaboration in international organizations, science and people-to-people contacts.

Belarus and Japan have been good partners for many years, and as we find ourselves in an all new post-COVID-19 world I am sure our extended bilateral record will serve our nations well in further expanding our bilateral agenda and development of mutually beneficial cooperation.
