The start of the year was also a milestone for our robust economic relationship. In January, two important agreements entered into force: the U.S.-Japan Trade Agreement (USJTA) and our first ever digital trade agreement. We are already seeing the fruits of these achievements. The USJTA has opened our respective markets wider to two-way trade, especially in key sectors like agriculture. Meanwhile, the U.S.-Japan Digital Trade Agreement has positioned our countries to be global pace-setters in digital innovation and online commerce.

Although we continue to grapple with the wide-ranging effects of COVID-19, the crisis has highlighted many avenues of cooperation between the United States and Japan. As the virus spread onboard the Diamond Princess cruise ship, our countries worked together to coordinate care for those who fell ill and to repatriate American passengers. Our close collaboration has also been seen in joint trials and research efforts by U.S. and Japanese health experts in search of potential treatments.

While this Independence Day may not have the sort of visible commemoration activities as in years past, the reasons we celebrate remain unchanged. Just as the founders wrote in the historic Declaration of Independence in 1776, we remain firm in our conviction that all are created equal with inalienable rights to Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. We recognize that more work — hard work — is necessary to realize true equality and "a more perfect union," but we are fortunate to travel the road ahead with close friends like Japan that share our values and global vision.
