then-economic liaison office has evolved into a full-fledged embassy, and we now also have five honorary consulates throughout Japan to facilitate grassroots exchanges and other important *kizuna* (bonding) activities in Fukuoka, Osaka, Kochi, Sendai and Kushiro, Hokkaido Prefecture.

Japan has been contributing significantly to the nation-building endeavors of my country through its overseas development program. Construction of major infrastructure such as ports and airports, as well as roads and many other public facilities have been made possible from the support and technical assistance of the government of Japan. Our passenger-cargo vessels and maritime surveillance units are also provided through the kind assistance of Japan. As an ocean country with a vast ocean territory and dependence on the resources of the sea for sustenance, this assistance is deeply appreciated. The Japan International Cooperation Agency volunteers and technical training programs have become an integral part of our island government, especially in the fields of education and capacity building of our workforce. the FSM, in turn, continues to maintain its consistent support for Japan's permanent membership on the United Nations Security Council and Japan's candidatures in other international organizations. Both countries have also collaborated in addressing issues of importance, including climate change, health, the environment, disaster risk management, alternative energy and many others, through regional and multilateral arrangements.

As the world struggles to cope with the sad and devastating effects of the pandemic, the FSM acknowledges with profound appreciation the early support from the government of Japan in the FSM's efforts to prevent the arrival of COVID-19 onto its shores and to protect its people.

While government-to-government interaction is strong and still continues to be built upon, the catalyst and reinforcing strength behind the good and lasting kizuna between our peoples is the historical people-to-people relationship that began over 100 years ago. This has developed and evolved into the present-day commercial trade and business interactions between our respective private

sectors that we are benefiting from today.

The recently established network between Japan's local governments and the Pacific island countries is a promising platform that is hoped to further spur these exchanges, not only from the government sector, but also through the involvement of the private sector at the grassroots level. Through the network, it is hoped that the kizuna between the FSM and Japan will progress to new and higher levels.
