To think about the Dominican Republic is to immediately imagine pictures

of endless white-sand beaches under a perpetual sun, and they are real. There is no doubt the Dominican Republic has many of the most amazing beaches in the world. More than 750 miles of coastline and about 5 million tourists each year are testament to that.

If you mix our beautiful nature with a culture characterized by music and dance, as in merengue, bachata and folkloric, you will have sweet smiley people treating you warmly as relatives all the time.

Founding father Juan Pablo Duarte designed our flag, which is the only one in the world to have an image of the holy Bible on it. It reads, "And the truth shall make you free."

As a tourist destination, the Dominican Republic also offers world-class resorts and golf courses. It has recently been distinguished as the Capital of the Gastronomic Culture of the Caribbean, highlighting the exotic and delicious Caribbean foods you can enjoy.

The landmark of Santo Domingo's Colonial Zone is the Cathedral of Santa

Maria la Menor, the oldest in the Americas, built between 1512 and 1540.

Visitors also have plenty of opportunities to go scuba diving to enjoy our beautiful coral reefs, hiking, biking, horseback riding, and many more experiences to delight your senses.

Every year off the northeastern coast, in the Bay of Samana, humpback whales can be seen migrating from the North Atlantic to warm Dominican waters. They stay until March before returning to their summer environs.

The lowest elevation in the Caribbean is Lake Enriquillo, a hypersaline lake covering 375 sq. kilometers. A diverse and interesting wildlife population inhabits the lake and its surroundings, among them beautiful pink flamingos.

The Dominican Republic is also home to the highest elevation in the region. At 3,087 meters, Pico Duarte welcomes over 3,000 climbers a year who make the ascent to experience its incredible beauty.

The palmchat is the national bird, and like Dominicans, palmchats are known to be joyful, noisy, social and love singing.
