This is a very special and important time for Slovenia. On June 25, we are celebrating the 30th anniversary of our independence and almost at the same time, on July 1, Slovenia will take over the

presidency of the European Uunion Council. Both events are important and significant signs of our development as a democratic, prosperous and free country in the heart of Europe.

The events that unfolded in Slovenia 30 years ago made an enormous impact on the lives of our citizens. For the first time in our history, we decided to form our own state, and thus a 1,000-year-old dream of Slovenians to live in an independent state finally came true. With our independence from Yugoslavia, Slovenia also joined the democratic world, with free elections and the adoption of a new constitution devoted to respect for human rights and the rule of law. I and fellow Slovenians who experienced the evening of June 25, 1991, will never forget the feeling of this glorious day.

Today, Slovenia is an active member of the EU and NATO, devoted to nourishing and strengthening cooperation with friendly nations and building effective multilateralism. For the second time since its membership in the EU, Slovenia will in 2021 assume the presidency of the EU Council, this time in quite unpredictable and difficult circumstances. The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted our economy and social life and imposed limits on our travel. Thus, we are fully aware that with the presidency comes also the responsibility — to engage, lead and participate with all our knowledge and resources to recover from the pandemic and build a European and globally bright future. The main objectives of our presidency

will be to address the damage from the pandemic, restore the normal functioning of European societies and promote the recovery of the economy, which the members of the EU believe should be green, renewable and sustainable. We will strive to improve the resilience and strategic autonomy of the EU so that we are better prepared to meet such challenges in the future. Slovenia will also engage in debate under the framework of the Conference on the Future of Europe and help promote the European way of life, rule of law, and equal criteria for all.

Among our foreign policy priorities, it is our aim to reaffirm the EU perspective of the Western Balkans. This region is at our doorstep, and due to its geographic proximity, common history and economic ties, the peace, stability and development of this part of Europe is in Slovenia's vital interest. We will also encourage the EU to hold debate on the importance of the Indo-Pacific region for global stability, peace and prosperity.

During this time of celebration, Slovenia remembers all nations that helped us along the path toward sovereignty and independence. Japan recognized Slovenia in 1992, and since then our relations have been friendly and developed further. Japanese have discovered the treasures of Slovenian nature, food and wine, and Slovenians admire Japanese hospitality and kindness.

Political ties are growing stronger. To mention just the latest official visit, Slovenia was honored to host Minister of Foreign Affairs

Toshimitsu Motegi in April. Common projects and cooperation are blooming in economics and science, and the Port of Koper is becoming increasingly attractive for Japanese transport to Central Europe. We are also exploring possibilities for further collaboration with Japan in digitalization, cybersecurity, high-tech and artificial intelligence. I must say that we are proud to emphasize that Slovenia is one of the most active countries participating in the projects and activities behind the implementation of Japan's "Society 5.0" plan

In past years, our mutual respect and long-lasting friendship were reflected in successful economic cooperation. Slovenia has been recognized by Japanese companies as a reliable partner and as a business environment that offers qualified and skilled labor, high productivity, a friendly atmosphere and easy access to the vast markets of the EU and Western Balkans region. The number of Japanese investments in Slovenia is only growing, and mutually they are viewed as success stories. Since 2013, foreign direct investment from Japan to Slovenia has grown 10 times,

placing Japan among the top 10 countries investing in Slovenia.

Another passion that unites Slovenia and Japan is sports. Both nations are devoted to active life, and there is ongoing and long-lasting collaboration between teams, athletes and federations. Therefore, in conclusion, allow me to wish also that during the upcoming Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Games, the ties between Slovenia and Japan will become even stronger and that our appreciation of the importance of solidarity and mutual understanding will prevail.

Adventure at every turn

Where better to start than Slovenia's capital. Ljubljana was named the Green Capital of Europe in 2016 and you'll soon discover why as you wander the many green spaces or enjoy a coffee along the leafy banks of the Ljubljanica River, which flows through

people seeking out the freshest Slovenian produce while the beautiful architecture of Slovenia's great architect Joze Plecnik makes walking the cobbled streets a true

Another undeniable Instagram-worthy highlight is Lake Bled. Bled is perhaps Slovenia's most famous example of natural beauty, with a picture-postcard church perched on a small islet surrounded by emerald green waters and the peaks of the mighty Julian Alps in the background.

Adventurers can enjoy Bled's many hiking, biking, canyoning and other water sports opportunities while those who appreciate a slower pace can indulge in a slice of traditional Bled cream cake at one of the many cafes that populate the shoreline.

Alternatively, people can take a journey to the coast. Slovenia's coastline is modest yet beautiful, with a handful of sun-drenched coastal towns famous for their wine, olive oil and salt. Of Slovenia's three main seaside towns — Koper, Izola and Piran — it is Piran that is most impressive. With its Venetian Gothic architecture, Piran's Old Town is one of the best-preserved historical towns anywhere in the Mediterranean.

Adventure even awaits underground at the Postojna Caves. This subterranean paradise is one of the world's most captivating, with magnificent cave formations and diverse fauna. The Postojna Caves boast towering mountains, murmuring rivers and vast subterranean halls, not to mention Postojna's most iconic inhabitant — the famous "baby dragon."

Europe's new culinary capital

In recent years, Slovenia has established itself as one of Europe's most exciting culinary destinations. The country was named European Region of Gastronomy 2021 and a new Michelin guide to Slovenia has been unveiled to celebrate the chefs who are helping raise Slovenian cuisine to new heights. Among them is Ana Ros, named the world's best female chef in 2017 and now proud owner of two Michelin stars at her restaurant Hisa Franko.

And what better to accompany firstclass food than first-class wine? Slovenia's winemaking tradition goes back centuries. The fertile soil accommodates 52 varieties of grape, including the country's own Teran, a full-bodied grape grown

from the rich red soils of the Karst region. The country is also home to what has been voted the world's best orange wine, a floral, honey-colored variety unique to the Goriska Brda region. The Vipava Valley, one of Slovenia's most prominent winegrowing areas, is just an hour's drive from Ljubljana.

A Green&Safe destination

Already considered one of the world's safest and greenest countries, Slovenia has gone one step further and created the Green&Safe responsible travel standard to ensure that travelers remain safe as tourism reopens. In fact, Slovenia was one of the first countries in the world to receive a Safe Travels Stamp from the World Travel and Tourism Council.

The Green&Safe label represents Slovenia's commitment to responsible, green, and safe tourism. It has only been presented to those tourism businesses and destinations that guarantee travelers the highest possible hygiene standards and protocols. What's more, Slovenia's tourism sector is also a priority in terms of the country's vaccination efforts to help keep travelers safe.


