Among those episodes are the Chernobyl nuclear catastrophe and the Great East Japan Earthquake, followed by the Fukushima No. 1 nuclear disaster. 2021 marks 35 and 10 years, respectively, since these national tragedies occurred. The sad anniversaries are giving us a chance to deeply comprehend the consequences of these devastating events and reflect on the strong emotional bond between Belarusians and Japanese united by the experience of living through accidents at nuclear power plants. Our present-day cooperation is based on the experience of the past, and it also lays the ground for future engagements. The current engagement between our two nations extends from business and investment, cultural and humanitarian collaboration to contacts between Belarusian and Japanese regions and cities and bilateral engagement in international organizations.

This year bilateral trade turnover looks promising, which proves that Belarusian-Japanese economic cooperation stands resilient to global challenges.

Recently, the Belarusian Chamber of Commerce and Industry appointed a representative in Japan, and our new honorary consul opened an office. These events will surely make an additional significant contribution to furthering the development of the Belarus-Japan relationship.

The Belarusian government will keep on exploring new and unorthodox ways of



bilateral engagement on our post-COVID realities and continue to develop dialogue with our Japanese partners when discussing matters of mutual interest and concern, including commerce and investment, cultural and youth exchanges, science, sports, human rights, international security, health care, climate change and other areas.

These days the attention of the whole world is focused on Japan as host of the Olympic and Paralympic Games. It is my strong belief that Tokyo will hold this remarkable sporting event that symbolizes humankind's unbeatable spirit, ever-lasting aspiration and invincible will in a safe and secure manner.
