2021 has been an especially meaningful year for our friendship as most members of the Mexican delegation who

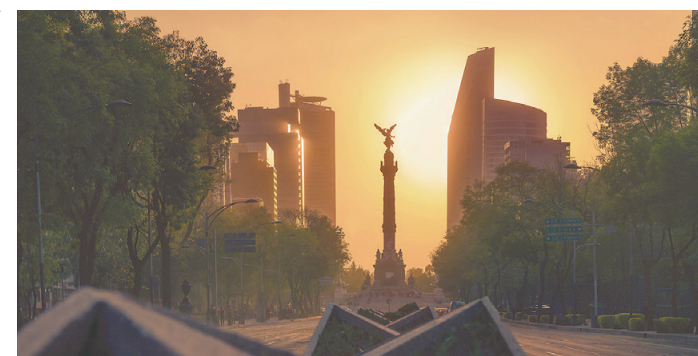

Join us in this very special celebration. Discover our millenary culture and the many great traditions that come with it.

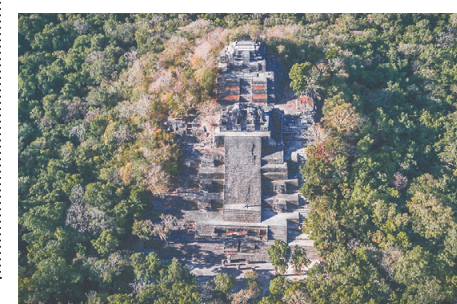

Exchanges with Hiroshima continue to blossom

On behalf of Hiroshima Prefecture, I would like to offer my sincerest congratulations on the auspicious occasion of the Independence Day of the United Mexican States.

Prompted by the expansion of Hiroshima-based companies into the State of Guanajuato, Hiroshima and Guanajuato created a memorandum on economic exchanges in 2013 and established a friendship alliance in 2014. Ever since, Hiroshima and the United Mexican States have deepened these ties

via mutual governor visits, student exchanges and cultural festivals.

In 2017, the Mexican Olympic Committee agreed to hold the Mexican Olympic team's training camps in Hiroshima,

allowing 334 athletes to prepare for the Games from 2018 to 2019. Our friendship deepened further through local exchanges, including practices with residents and visits

to elementary and junior high schools. In 2020, a similar agreement was reached with the Mexican Paralympic Committee.

This year, despite the difficult circumstances, 123 Mexican Olympic and Paralympic athletes stayed in Hiroshima to prepare for the Games. I would like to once again express my utmost respect to Mexico's athletes, who competed valiantly.

The end of this festival is an opportune time for Hiroshima and Mexico to continue developing this friendship, and we would like to ask for Mexico's continued support and cooperation in these endeavors.
